Pharmacy Interoperability and Emerging Therapeutics Task Force 2023 Charge

Overarching charge: Identify recommendations to support interoperability between pharmacy constituents, and the exchange of information necessary for medication management, patient safety and consumer engagement.

Recommendations Due: November 9, 2023

Specific charge:

- 1. Public Health, Emergency Use Authorizations, and Prescribing Authorities
- 2. Identify opportunities and recommendations to improve interoperability between pharmacy constituents (prescribers, pharmacists, pharmacy benefit managers, dispensers, payers, intermediaries, PDMPs, public health agencies, HIEs, third party service providers, consumers, etc.) for pharmacy-based clinical services and care coordination.
- 3. Identify standards needs to support prescribing and management of emerging therapies including, but not limited to specialty medications, digital therapeutics, and gene therapies.
- 4. Identify policy and technology needs and considerations for direct-to-consumer medication services.

Patient Case

- Patient is enrolled in a care coordination service through the pharmacy
 - Patient expressed sincere concern about affording electricity and heat
 - Patient stated they had been receiving assistance from DAEOC but hadn't heard anything for this year.
- Community Health Worker / Pharmacy Technician was able to verify patient eligibility and get the forms to the patient to keep their assistance active.



DAEOC is a private, not-for-profit Community Action Agency serving counties in Southeast Missouri. DAEOC administers programs designed to combat poverty and provide economic opportunities in the Bootheel.





Long-Term Win: Standardized Pharmacy Quality

- Importance to measure and report:
 - How does the measure address community pharmacy practice?
- Scientific acceptability of measure properties:
 What is the evidence (empirical or not) to support improvement or
 this measure? Is the patient population large enough (reliable) to
 see a difference?

NQF Feasibility Criterion: Extent to which the required data are readily available, retrievable without undue burden, and can be implemented for performance measurement

- Feasibility:
 - Is the data from the pharmacy? Can the pharmacy calculate the measure?
- Usability and Use:
 - Does the measure help inform practice changes?
- Comparison to related or competing measures:
 Are the measures vertically integrated with the rest of healthcare quality?



- Assessment of Weights in Pediatrics

 - NB: 60% of pediatric antibiotics are dosed incorrectly from the prescriber
- Assessment of Renal Function in Older Adults
 - Percentage of patients 65 years and older with a serum creatinine on file at the pharmacy
- Medication Indication
 - Percentage of electronic prescriptions with ICD-10
- Improving Pain Management Safety
 - Percentage of households at risk for opioid overdose with naloxone
